1. Curriculum/Instruction/Assessment

- Dynamic Learning Map (alternative assessment for students with significant disabilities- testing window 3/28 through 5/20) Update - All required staff administering the Dynamic Learning Map (DLM) have successfully completed all training and requirements for the testing window period. Students will take the alternative assessment 1:1 with a teacher on a tablet on the assessment portal.
- ACT Aspire and Forward Exam assessment accommodations will be inputted in the next few weeks, per testing regulation guidelines.
- RtI Committee has new and updated informational brochures for staff and families regarding the RtI process. I have been presenting the new ABC Team (Academic/Behavior Concern Team) documents and protocols in line with the RtI process at each building. This continues to be a collaborative and proactive approach to meeting all students academic and behavioral needs.

2. News and Noteworthy

- Special education staff and physical education staff have received professional development at February's PD day regarding Adaptive Physical Education for students with disabilities. There was training and an overview of Adaptive P.E., qualifying for services and assessment, as well as programming into student IEPs and being an active IEP participant (requirements). A lot of valuable discussion happened regarding our current practice and the direction in which we are looking to move as a district in this area.
- On March 17th, approximately 15 of our students with disabilities (Junior and Senior status) will be attending the MATC campus for a 'Moving Forward' event involving junior and senior students of some districts located in Jefferson County. The event provides team-building opportunities and session presentations in the areas of self-advocacy, interviewing skills and mock interviews, financial literacy, keeping a job,

college preparation, technology, renting and living arrangements, rights and responsibilities (once 18+ years old), insurance, and social media. Our staff and students are excited to attend this event!
