School Board Report and Update School/Building – Palmyra-Eagle High/Middle School Principal – Kari Timm April 12, 2016

1. Curriculum/Instruction/Assessment

Forward Exam and ACT Aspire testing windows are open or will be opening shortly. We are working on a schedule that will impact class instruction and minimally as possible. Teachers will be showing students some training videos for the Forward exam during resources next week and then they will have an opportunity to do some sample test questions in their individual classes.

We are working on the high school and middle school master schedules for the 2016-17 school year. We plan to have the same wheel/exploratory offerings in the middle school next year. We also plan to continue with the resource period. This period has been very successful in allowing for intervention, academic support and enrichment time for students. We look forward to continuing to modify and adjust our offerings to meet the needs of all our students and staff.

I am discussing the beginnings of a GEDO2 program with curriculum and policy this month. The formation of this program here at PEHS would allow us to not have to send students off campus for alternative programs if they are not on track to receive their diploma. We currently send 10+ kids off campus a school year and the cost is getting more expensive every year. By keeping these students in our building and running the program we can over them a more personalized experience and all them to remain in some of our regular classes. We plan to move forward with this in the next couple months, with the hope of starting the program next year.

1. Curriculum/Instruction/Assessment

- Dynamic Learning Map (alternative assessment for students with significant disabilities- testing window 3/28 through 5/20) Update -Students will begin taking this exam in a 1:1 setting situation the week of April 18th through the end of the month on individualized schedules.
- ACT Aspire and Forward Exam assessment accommodations have been submitted at all grade levels participating throughout the district, per testing regulation guidelines and individualized needs.
- Curriculum selection is underway for the district's 7th grade through age 21 self-contained program. All content area curriculums and resources are being reviewed and identified in order to facilitate building a comprehensive and research-based curriculum to further meet a variety of disability levels and needs.

2. News and Noteworthy

- The Transition team has been meeting regularly and putting forth a lot of work and effort in making community and business connections to start promoting integrated work experiences for all students. A copy of a business partnership letter is included with this. To date I have received a couple of phone calls and responses back from local businesses in response to building a partnership with PEASD students and staff. We are excited for these future opportunities!
- On March 17th, approximately 15 of our students with disabilities (Junior and Senior status)attended MATC campus for a 'Moving Forward' event involving junior and senior students of some districts located in Jefferson County. The event provided team-building opportunities and session presentations in the areas of self-advocacy, interviewing skills and mock interviews, financial literacy, keeping a job, college preparation, technology, renting and living arrangements, rights and responsibilities (once 18+ years old), insurance, and social media. The students were

very respectful and overall enjoyed the information and opportunity to attend this event.
