Technology Enhancements

Technology is a critical tool for learning and working. Access to these curricular resources is integral to the learning process in Palmyra-Eagle. The Palmyra-Eagle Area School District continues to make improvements toward providing increased access to technology and equitable learning

environments that provide opportunities for all students to become proficient and interactive users of technology. We are working with a new Technology Committee, focusing on staff



professional development and our 1:1 program. The district has made significant investments into strengthening our infrastructure to ensure reliability of our systems. This past summer, we have doubled the size of our wireless network and built in several redundancies into our servers and network. Another project of interest is a cost study to determine the cost of ownership of a fiber optic connection between Eagle Elementary and the High School / Middle School building. Doing so has the potential to save the district in leasing fees for our current connection. We look forward to reporting the results of our study in the upcoming months.

FFA National Convention

Three Palmyra-Eagle FFA members, Katherine and Kirstin Novak and Dana Meyers, attended the 90th National FFA Convention in Indianapolis this fall. The group began the week by attending Opening Session where they listened to the National FFA Band and Chorus, and several speakers including, Keynote Speaker, Laila Ali. Nature Trail Dedication

The nature trail behind the high/middle school finally has a name! After some discussion and research, the trail has been aptly and deservedly named the "Jim Demler Nature Trail".

Mr. Demler, a retired Palmyra-Eagle High School biology/science teacher, was instrumental in preserving the land surrounding the trail. He, along with Mr. Doug Zick, retired PEASD Buildings and Grounds Director, discovered and

identified a rare flower, the fringed gentian, on the trail's acreage. The find of this flower was even more special because this gentian only grows in a rare wetland known as a fen. There are only



about 300 fens known to exist in the United States, and one is located on the

Former students of Mr. Demler affectionately remember going out to the fen and removing invasive species in order to protect the habitat. Even after retiring in 2005, he returned to the site to work and run workshops related to the specific environment.

Mr. Mike Hoff, a former student of Mr. Demler and current Palmyra-Eagle HS Tech Ed Teacher, had his Advanced Woods Class create the trail sign which was presented to Mr. Demler today. Tyler Nokes and Michael Schaab were especially involved in the project and are pictured. Stay tuned for further information posted on the sign including: a trail map, timeline, environmental features and facts and geocaching locations along the trail.

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Commemorating 9/11

Eagle Nature Trail volunteer, Jean Weedman, helped students identify the trees and explained the variance of growth due to location within the environment. Eagle Elementary Principal, Matt Stich, further explained, "To help pay tribute to those who were impacted by the tragic events of September 11th, 2001, students and staff paid a visit to the seven Memorial Trees planted four years ago by Eagle Elementary students and staff. These trees, which were planted by acorns from New York City, represent new growth and help us remember a day that will never be forgotten. Reading Curriculum

Lucy Calkins is the founder of the Readers' and Writers' Workshop which was implemented in the district five years ago for writing, and four years ago for reading. The workshop model follows a simple concept-VOLUME! The curriculum's belief, which has been proven again and again

through research, is that the more students read and write, the better readers and writers they will become. In our elementary schools, all grade levels follow the workshop model. We begin our teaching for the workshop with a ten minute "mini-lesson" - teaching new skills and strategies to our readers and writers in guiding them to become strong readers and writers. The remainder of the hour workshop revolves around the students partaking in reading and writing! Less teacher talk and more student reading and writing is the key to

success. Students work at their level of reading and writing, and teachers work with small groups or individuals while the rest of the students work independently. The students read and write for longer periods of time, coupled with their at-home reading and writing leads to success in literacy.

Steve Greenquist (Principal), Tami Harpster (Reading Specialist), Kathy Retzke (Curriculum and Instruction) and Jennifer Quella (Title 1) had the wonderful opportunity of attending a Reading or Writing Institute in New York. This is the home base of Lucy Calkins, as well as the Teachers College, Columbia University. Mr. Greenquist's focus at the Institute was using STEAM activities in literacy; Mrs. Harpster had the opportunity to teach in a New York Public School in Brooklyn coaching teachers in Workshop; and Mrs. Retzke and Mrs. Quella's focus of their Institute was best practice within the Readers' Workshop model.

Bullying Prevention Program

Palmyra-Eagle Middle/High Schools adopted the Olweus Bullying Prevention Program as a means to promote positive culture within the building. The Olweus Program, developed by Dr. Dan Olweus, Ph.D., is a comprehensive approach which includes school wide, classroom, individual, and community components. It has been found to reduce bullying among students, improve the social climate of classrooms, and reduce antisocial behaviors.

International youth motivational speaker, Scott Backovich, was signed to kick-off the new program and start dialogue within the building about how student actions and/or inactions towards others truly do make a difference. He gave an engaging, humorous, yet very inspiring address by connecting with students on their level. Backovich had them laughing while still asking them to reflect on their own behaviors. After the large group assemblies, smaller groups



of students attended interactive workshops to further develop leadership skills.

Associate Principal, Nick Jones, is part of the Olweus leadership team at the building and secured Backovich as a speaker. He said, "It was by chance that I found Scott after doing a google search for high school speakers. His name came up in the top 10 high school speakers in the country. I think the students were pretty surprised that we brought in a legit professional to speak to culture building and how to be a catalyst for change."

Freshman Draws Winning Design

Village of Eagle Police Chief Gregg Duran and Officer Frank Emanuele recently visited Palmyra-Eagle High School to reveal their department's new logo which was designed by freshman Jenna Johnson. Her design



District Adopts New Grading System

Palmyra-Eagle High School graduates of the year of 2021 and beyond will be graded and ranked with a new system. The district adopted a different platform which aims to motivate students to take more challenging courses without fear of impacting their class rank. The plan had been discussed at length for several years with the administrative team and the school board. This system will differentiate between + and grades, eliminate class rank, and incorporate the Laude System. The Laude System recognizes students for the rigor of their classes as well as their letter grades. A laude score is calculated by multiplying a student's cumulative GPA by the number of honor points they have earned from laude courses. Designated laude courses will include honor level classes, advanced placement classes, upper level elective courses and 4th year music classes. Three levels of recognition are achieved by the laude process: Summa Cum Laude (Highest Honor), Magna Cum Laude (Great Honor), Cum Laude (Honor). Principal Kari Timm hopes that, "the new policy will decrease comparison and competition among classmates solely for student rank while also giving students control."



Soccer Co-op

This was the first year that Palmyra-Eagle joined a co-op with East Troy for Boys' Soccer. The team finished 4th in the Rock Valley Conference. Panther freshman, Jacob Stroh, played for the team and had a great experience. He stated, "All the boys were very accepting of each other no matter which school you attended. 
